- *Diabetes is Costing Americans \$174 Billion Annually*

Earlier this month, the American Diabetes Association released a new cost estimate for diabetes, "The Economic Costs of Diabetes in the U.S. in 2007." The study estimates that diabetes is costing Americans \$174 billion annually. The ADA, the Congressional Diabetes Caucus leadership, and diabetes experts from the CDC and NIH discussed the economic impact of this compelling new data during a congressional briefing on January 23. The study reveals that the direct economic costs associated with diabetes have reached unprecedented levels, increasing 32 percent since the last estimate was completed five years ago. Medical expenditures of care for people with diabetes are estimated to be \$116 billion, with a disproportionate percentage of the costs resulting from treatment and hospitalization of people with diabetes-related complications. The findings also suggest that 1 out of every 5 health care dollars is spent caring for someone with diagnosed diabetes. Considering that an additional 6 million more people are believed to have diabetes but have not yet been diagnosed, the study estimates that the actual cost of diabetes may greatly exceed \$174 billion. Did You Know???

FASCINATING FACT

- CMS issued a National Coverage Decision (NCD) in 2006 providing for Home Health Visits to a Blind Diabetic. The purpose is to assist diabetics with prefilling syringes. **However, CMS does not cover, under Part B, adaptive devices that would help a blind, or partially sighted, diabetic administer their own medications,** under the theory that the adaptive device is simply part of the syringe (note, however, that Part D does now cover syringes, but does not appear to expand this to adaptive devices).

LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

- H.R. 2762, reauthorizing the *Special Diabetes Programs for Type I Diabetes and Indians*. The bill would reauthorize the special diabetes programs for type 1 research and prevention/treatment for Native Americans for five years, with an increase in funding. The bill includes a five-year reauthorization at increased funding levels for both programs. The bill currently has 231 cosponsors
- H.R. 1647, *including podiatrists as physicians for purposes of covering physicians services under the Medicaid Program*. The bill would classify podiatrists as physicians for purposes of direct reimbursement through the Medicaid program. The bill currently has 190 cosponsors.
- H.R. 2210, the *“Diabetes Prevention Access and Care Act of 2007.”* The Diabetes Prevention Access and Care Act is designed to promote research, treatment, and education regarding diabetes in minority populations. This specific focus will help us address the unique challenges faced by minority populations and provide more effective treatment and education. The bill currently has 70 cosponsors.
- H.R. 4218, the *“Medicare Diabetes Self-Management Training Act of 2007.”* The bill would recognize certified diabetes educators as providers for Medicare diabetes outpatient self-management training services. The bill currently has 6 cosponsors. Please look for a Dear Colleague letter in the next few weeks regarding the bill.
